

## ISC Primary Years Programme English Language Scope and Sequence

The following document seeks to lay out the minimum requirement to be taught in English for each grade level in each of the areas of oral, written and visual language. During the construction of this Curriculum Document every effort has been made to ensure the alignment all the elements of the Austrian National Curriculum and the IB PYP Scope and Sequence for Language.
